IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR YOU - THE OWNER

A WORD OF CAUTION ABOUT PUPPY DISEASE PREVENTION

Puppies are not protected from the dangers of certain diseases like Parvo Virus and Distemper with just one vaccination. They need at least two vaccines and sometimes all four in order to be fully protected. **You MUST protect your puppy by using some common sense until they are completely vaccinated.** One of the worst places to take your puppy right now, would be to the veterinarian's office, because this is where people take their sick pets for the care they require. You obviously cannot avoid taking your puppy to the vets, but you must take the proper precautions knowing that your puppy is vulnerable right now.

1. Do not let your puppy on the ground, inside or outside, even to go to the bathroom. Do this prior to going for your visit.
2. Do not let your puppy socialize with any animals at the appointment.
3. Take a blanket or towel with you to the vets and use it to cover the examination table. Most disinfectants must stay in contact with the surface for 10 minutes or longer in order to effectively kill any viruses. Your vet may not have the time to follow these directions precisely.
4. Finally, do not overly protect your puppy to the extent that you hinder his proper socialization process. He should be allowed to meet the dog next door if you are certain that they have been properly vaccinated and are healthy. Just be aware that he needs extra protection for a few more weeks and plan ahead for his overall safety.

PUPPIES AND PARASITES

Even though all of our puppies have been on a thorough worming schedule, as are the parents, you must still assume that your pup may have worms or parasites that will need to be taken care of - after you bring

your new puppy home. Your vet will do a routine stool sample check at each visit in order to be sure you have effectively treated long enough to break the continuing cycle.

It is more difficult to eradicate all parasites when the littermates are all together as they pass them back and forth even under the cleanest of environments. Puppies do not have parasites because of lack of care or a dirty environment. Once they go to their new homes, they have the added benefit of not having other puppies to pass parasites back and forth with.

It is very possible for the puppies to have a negative stool sample here with us and then due to the stress of moving become susceptible to them again. Giardia and Coccidia are very prone to showing up during the stressful time of transitioning into a new home. We disinfect daily with very expensive disinfectants and we keep our puppies in our home in order to do everything we can to help avoid this problem.

Thoroughly washing your hands and practicing good hygiene are very important especially with young children as some parasites can be transmitted to humans. With that being said our own family, with all of the puppies and dogs we are with on a daily basis, have never had this occur. But understanding the possibility exists will encourage you to use caution.

Checking for and continuing to treat for parasites is a big part of responsible puppy ownership. Some common signs of worms/parasites can be loose stool or diarrhea and even small amounts of blood or mucous in their stool.

When you take a stool sample to your vet appointment, only a small sample is required. You can place it in any container or even a Ziploc baggie. The fresher the sample the better. If you receive a negative result please note that this does not necessarily mean that your puppy is free from parasites. It only means that there were no eggs found in that particular sample. If the worms were not passing eggs at the time the stool was taken then nothing would be found. But, they can still be positive for

worms. So you must continue to combine what you see at home in the stool with what your vet sees in the sample. You can feel confident that your pup is parasite free if you do not see any signs of parasites – specifically loose or bloody stool and you have at least two negative stool samples in a row.

Puppies that have just switched environments or had food changes will often have loose stool, this is normal and is not a sign of parasites. If after your pup is fully adjusted to his new home, you see diarrhea or other changes, this could be something to pay attention to. Continuing to check for and treat for parasites/worms or protozoa is all part of responsible puppy care. ALWAYS CHECK WITH YOUR VETERINARIAN FOR PROPER PARASITE CARE

What Pet Owners Need to Know About Rabies Vaccinations in New York State

(Effective November 20, 2002, this information sheet must be provided by pet dealers to consumers upon point of sale of cats, dogs, and ferrets.)

State law requires rabies vaccinations (shots) for all cats, dogs and domesticated ferrets!

(Note: Ferrets are illegal in New York City.)

Where can I get my pet vaccinated?

All counties (excluding New York City counties) are required to provide a free vaccination clinic every four months. Contact your county health department for the schedule in your area. Rabies vaccinations are also available from your veterinarian. If you have questions about new vaccines developed specifically for cats and for pets at younger ages, contact your veterinarian.

When should my pet receive its first rabies vaccination?

The law requires that your pet's first rabies vaccination be given no later than four months (three months in New York City) after its date of birth. Many rabies vaccines are licensed for use at three months, although some may be given at younger ages.

When should my pet receive its second rabies vaccination?

Your pet should receive its second rabies vaccination within one year after the first vaccination. The second rabies shot and all shots thereafter are sometimes called booster shots.

After my pet gets its second rabies shot, when is the next booster shot due?

After the second rabies shot, you need to get additional booster shots either annually or every three years, depending on the type of vaccine administered.

What proof will I have that my pet received its rabies shots?

The veterinarian, or a person under the veterinarian's supervision, will provide you with a certificate as proof that your pet has been vaccinated. The veterinarian's office will also keep a copy of your pet's vaccination certificate. The law requires the veterinarian to provide the vaccination certificate to any public health official for any case involving your dog, cat or ferret that may have been exposed to rabies, or in any case of possible exposure of a person or another animal to rabies.

What if my pet needs to be taken to the veterinarian?

Whenever you bring your pet to a veterinarian, s/he will verify if the animal is up-to-date on its rabies shots. If the animal is not up-to-date on its rabies shots or exempt as stated below, or if the veterinarian cannot find proof of the animal's rabies vaccination history, you may request your pet be vaccinated at that time.

*If my pet bites a person, does it have to be euthanized (put to sleep)? **

If your pet bites a person and you wish to avoid euthanizing and testing it for rabies, it must be confined and observed for ten days. If your pet is not up-to-date on its rabies shots, the ten-day confinement/observation period must take place, at the owner's expense, at an appropriate facility such as an animal shelter, veterinarian's office, or kennel. If your pet is up-to-date on its rabies shots, the county health department may allow the ten-day confinement/observation period to take place in your home. During the ten-day confinement period, the county or a designated party must verify that your pet is under confinement and observation, has remained healthy during and at the end of the ten-day period. (* In New York City, ten-day observation periods may be done at the home of the pet owner, regardless of the animal's rabies vaccination status.)

Fines

If your dog, cat or domesticated ferret is not vaccinated, is not up-to-date on its vaccinations, or is not properly confined after biting someone, as the owner you shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$200 for each offense. Additional fines may apply locally.

Exemptions

The vaccination requirements shall not apply to any dog, cat, domesticated ferret if the animal is transported through New York state and remains in the state 15 days or less; the animal is confined to the premises of an incorporated society devoted to the care of lost, stray or homeless animals; a licensed veterinarian has determined that the vaccination will adversely affect the animal's health; the animal is confined to the premises of a college or other educational or research institution for research purposes; or if the animal is unowned (feral, wild, not socialized).

Important Information about Your Pet

TOP 3 REASONS TO SPAY/NEUTER YOUR PET:

- > It helps to reduce companion animal overpopulation. Most countries have a surplus of companion animals and are forced to euthanize or disregard their great suffering. The surplus is in the millions in the United States.
- > Sterilization of your cat or dog will increase his/her chance of a longer and healthier life. Altered animals have a decreased risk of mammary gland tumors/cancer, prostate cancer, perianal tumors, pyometra and uterine, ovarian and testicular cancers.
- > Sterilizing your cat or dog makes him/her a better pet, reducing his/her urge to roam and decrease the risks of contracting diseases or getting hurt as they roam. Surveys indicate that as many as 85% of dogs hit by cars are unaltered. Intact male cats living outside have been shown to live on average less than two years. FIV and FeLV is spread by bites and intact cats fight a great deal more than altered cats.

Benefits of Spay/Neuter for Cats and Dogs:

- > no heat cycles, therefore, males won't be attracted
- > less desire to roam
- > **risk of mammary gland tumors, ovarian, uterine cancer is reduced** or eliminated, especially if done *before the first heat cycle*
- > reduces the number of unwanted kittens/puppies
- > helps dogs and cats live longer and healthier lives

Benefits of Neutering (Males):

- > reduces or eliminates risk of spraying or marking
- > less desire to roam, therefore less likely to be injured in fights or auto accidents
- > **risk of testicular cancer is eliminated and decreases incidence** of prostate disease
- > reduces number of unwanted kittens/puppies
- > decreases aggressive behavior, including dog bites
- > helps dogs and cats live longer and healthier lives

DOG LICENSING - IT'S THE LAW!

The owner of any dog reaching the age of 4 months shall immediately make application for a dog license.

~Apply for a dog license at your local licensing agent. This would be the clerk of the town, city or in some counties, village.

~Dogs harbored in NEW YORK CITY must be licensed through the NY City Department of Health.

New York State requires that all owned dogs be licensed, and every dog owner should have a dog license tag attached to their dog's collar while in public. Dog owners may be fined for violation of these laws.

Exemptions may apply for out of state-owned dogs who have a license from their state of residence.

Benefits of Licensing:

Licensing contributes to animal control and the protection of the public health:

- > information about licensed dogs assists in the medical follow-up of individuals potentially exposed to infected dogs, especially important during rabies outbreak
- > licensing helps reunited lost dogs with their owners.
- > licensing is key to family emergency preparedness planning to ensure a dog and owner is reunited in case of separation during a citywide emergency
- > licensing helps enforce the New York State spay/ neuter law, which mandates a surcharge on the license fee for unaltered dogs. Spaying or neutering is in the best interest of your pet because it helps reduce the stray animal population and may help reduce unwanted behaviors as well.

Health Guarantee

This agreement is between the Seller: Lakeshore Doodles and _____ ("Buyer") and covers only the dog listed in the purchase paperwork attached hereto. This contract is non-transferable and becomes null and void if the Buyer relinquishes ownership of the dog for any reason. Buyer agrees to contact Lakeshore Doodles if at any time they can no longer keep their Lakeshore Doodle puppy/dog. We will assist you if needed in locating a loving family. **Initial**_____

Buyer agrees and understands that it is necessary to protect the puppy from contagious diseases especially until the entire series of 4 vaccines has been given. The puppy should not come in contact with other puppies and should not be taken places where other puppies have been until they are fully protected by additional vaccines. At eight weeks of age, YOUR PUPPY HAS HAD ONLY ONE VACCINE, AS THIS IS THE PROPER VACCINE PROTOCOL FOR HIS/HER AGE – AND IS NOT FULLY PROTECTED AGAINST DEADLY CONTAGIOUS DISEASES LIKE PARVO VIRUS AND DISTEMPER (in addition to others). Protection also needs to be given at your veterinarian's office as people do take sick animals there and this could also be a potential risk to your new puppy. At Lakeshore Doodles we do our best to rid your puppy of parasites. However, it is possible for the puppy to have a negative stool sample at our vets, and then become infected due to the stress of moving to a new home. We highly recommend that you ask your vet do a routine stool sample check at each visit. We do not guarantee against parasites, viral or bacterial diseases unless covered under the NYS Law. **Initial**_____

Our guarantee is broken down into two parts. The first is as written according to the New York State Puppy Law, entitled "The Sale of Dog and Cats". You can read the law in its entirety on the next two pages. This guarantee is for the first 14 business days that you own the puppy and for 180 days for congenital malformation that adversely affects the dog's health. The second part of our guarantee can be found after the NYS law.

The NY law stipulates that you should take your puppy to the vet within 14 days of the purchase - but we highly recommend that you take the puppy within the first 2 days if at all possible. Your vet needs to see the puppy in the condition that it was in when you first picked it up because some illnesses can develop due to the stress of the move and it is very important for the vet to have a good "Baseline" to begin with right from the beginning. We have already taken your puppy to our veterinarian before sending it home as well.

We do not guarantee against accidental death, environmental based problems, non-genetic issues, parasites of any kind, theft or loss of dog due to anything other than what is listed in this contract or within the NYS "Sale of Dogs and Cats". We do not guarantee size, trainability, temperament, personality, color, coat type etc. We will always do our best to help you choose the best puppy for your family – but we cannot guarantee the final outcome as we have no control over how your dog has been handled after leaving our care. **Initial**_____

THE SALE OF DOGS AND CATS NOTICE

Article 35-D of the General Business Law, hereinafter referred to as “the Law”, sets forth certain rights which arise when a consumer purchases a dog or a cat from a pet dealer. Pursuant to the Law the Commissioner of Agriculture and Markets has promulgated regulations which require a pet dealer to provide certain information to a consumer in writing upon the sale of an animal. Such information shall include a description, including the breed of the animal, the date of purchase, the name, address and telephone number of the consumer and the pet dealer and the amount of the purchase. The pet dealer shall certify such information by signing and dating the document in which it is contained. Additionally, every pet dealer who sells an animal required to be vaccinated against rabies, to a consumer shall provide the consumer at point of sale with a written notice summarizing rabies immunization requirements.

The Law further provides that if, within fourteen business days following the sale of an animal subject to this article or receipt of the written notice required by section seven hundred fifty-four of this article, whichever occurred last, a veterinarian of the consumer's choosing, licensed by a state certifies such animal to be unfit for purchase due to illness or the presence of symptoms of a contagious or infectious disease, or if, within one hundred eighty calendar days following such sale or receipt, whichever occurred last, a licensed veterinarian certifies such animal to be unfit for purchase due to a congenital malformation which adversely affects the health of the animal, the pet dealer shall afford the consumer the right to choose one of the following options:

- ◆ The right to return the animal and receive a refund of the purchase price including sales tax and reasonable veterinary costs directly related to the veterinarian's certification that the animal is unfit for purchase; or
- ◆ The right to return the animal and to receive an exchange animal of the consumer's choice of equivalent value and reasonable veterinary costs directly related to the veterinarian's certification that the animal is unfit for purchase; or
- ◆ The right to retain the animal and to receive reimbursement from a pet dealer for veterinary services from a licensed veterinarian of the consumer's choosing, for the purpose of curing or attempting to cure the animal. The reasonable value of reimbursable services rendered to cure or attempting to cure the animal shall not exceed the purchase price of the animal. The value of such services is reasonable if comparable to the value of similar services rendered by other licensed veterinarians in proximity to treating veterinarians. Such reimbursement shall not include the costs of initial veterinary examination, fees and diagnostic fees not directly related to the veterinarian's certification that the animal is unfit for purchase.

The law requires that any refund and/or reimbursement required shall be made by a pet dealer not later than ten business days following receipt of a signed veterinary certificate as herein required. Such certification shall be presented to the pet dealer not later than three business days following receipt thereof by the consumer.

The Commissioner of Agriculture and Markets has prescribed a form for the certification that an animal is unfit for purchase which shall be provided to a consumer by an examining veterinarian upon the examination of a dog or cat subject to the Law. That form includes information which identifies the type of animal, the owner, the date and diagnosis of the animal, the treatment recommended, if any, and an estimate of the actual cost of such treatment. Such form also includes this notice.

The Law provides that a veterinary finding of intestinal parasites shall not be grounds for declaring the dog or cat unfit for sale unless the animal is clinically ill due to such condition. An animal may not be found unfit for sale on account of an injury sustained or illness contracted subsequent to the consumer taking possession thereof.

The Law provides that if a pet dealer wishes to contest a demand for a refund, exchange or reimbursement made by a consumer such dealer shall have the right to require the consumer to produce the animal for examination by a licensed veterinarian designated by such dealer. Upon examination if the consumer and the dealer are unable to reach an agreement which constitutes one of the options set forth in the Law within ten business days following receipt of the animal for such examination, the consumer may initiate an action in a court of competent jurisdiction to recover or obtain such refund, exchange and/or reimbursement. Nothing in § 753 of the General Business Law, however, in any way limits the rights or remedies which are otherwise available to consumers under any other law.

For the purposes of the Law, “consumer” means an individual purchasing a dog or a cat from a pet dealer. A pet dealer shall not be considered a consumer. “Pet dealer” means any person, firm, partnership, corporation or other association which in the ordinary course of business engages in the sale or offers for sale more than nine dogs or cats per year for profit to the public. Such definition includes breeders of animals who sell or offer to sell animals directly to a consumer but does not include duly incorporated humane societies dedicated to the care of unwanted animals which make such animals available for adoption whether or not a fee for such adoption is charged.

TWO YEAR HEALTH GUARANTEE

Lakeshore Doodles will guarantee your puppy until it reaches two years of age against crippling hip or elbow dysplasia, and genetic eye or heart conditions if they are life threatening if NuVet Plus is given. Crippling hip or elbow dysplasia diagnosis must be made by either OFA or Pennhip and the x-rays must be taken while the dog is under anesthesia and must be done when the dog is 24 months of age but not after 26 months of age. The other genetic disorders listed above must be diagnosed with the proper testing from a specialist in that specific field. For example: a genetic eye disorder must be diagnosed by a board-certified canine ophthalmologist or a genetic heart issue must be determined with the proper testing by a board certified canine cardiologist. Test results and copies of testing must be given to buyer within 2 days of the diagnosis. Also, under no circumstances shall the seller be liable for any consequential incidental or special damages resulting from or in any manner related to the dog. This warranty does not include and is not limited to: allergy or shedding issues, temperament or size issues, seizures, viral or bacterial illnesses, infections, improper bites, ear infections, hernias, hypoglycemia, Giardia, Coccidiosis or parasites of any kind. It also does not include any illness due to the ingestion of foreign objects, food, chemicals, physical injury or issues whose cause is unknown or may have an environmental link. Upon execution of this contract all veterinary care and its associated costs are the sole and exclusive responsibility of the buyer except as written in the NYS Law.

If the above requirements have been met, Lakeshore Doodles will offer a replacement puppy of equal value when one becomes available. Diagnosis must be given on veterinarian letterhead and a second opinion may be requested by Lakeshore Doodles at the expense of the Buyer. In the rare instance that the dog dies within this two-year period an autopsy must be done and an exact cause of death issued. Only issues proven to be 100% genetic will be covered under this guarantee. We will not refund any veterinarian fees for testing or treatment. The replacement puppy will be chosen after those buyers who already have deposits down on the litter - have picked theirs. If the buyer wants a puppy from a litter of greater value, the buyer will pay the difference in price between the two puppies. The buyer is solely responsible for all travel expenses to get the replacement puppy to their home. The puppy that is being replaced **may stay in the possession of the buyer** – but all previous and future medical expenses or treatments are the sole responsibility of the buyer. Buyer agrees that he/she understands this contract fully, and that this contract is under the jurisdiction of the State of New York, in the county of Orleans. In the event of any litigation in connection with this Guarantee, The Seller will be paid reasonable attorney fees by the Buyer. This contract is valid only for original purchaser and puppy, it is not transferable.

SPAY/NEUTER AGREEMENT: This puppy is being sold with a Spay/Neuter Agreement and it must be spayed or neutered by 6 months of age. Proof of neutering must be forwarded to Lakeshore Doodles by the time the puppy is 8 months of age. Failure to have this puppy spayed or neutered by 6 months of age and/or failure to forward proof of spaying or neutering by 8 months of age will void this 2-year health guarantee. No breeding rights have been given –

breeding of this puppy/dog is not allowed. Buyer may remove the dog from the owner if it has been bred without breeding rights or financial compensation will be paid 5x the original purchase price of the puppy to the seller.

To Your Vet:

We think it is important for you to know a little bit about how this puppy has been raised.

Our puppies are born in our living room and are raised in our home so that they can be properly socialized. They are completely isolated from any other animals (except our own dogs) and are never outdoors at all.

After the puppies have been weaned, they are raised in our nursery that is also in our home. We litter box train every puppy in order to develop the understanding, right from the start, that going potty on the floor is not what we do!

This puppy has been taken to our veterinarian for a thorough examination prior to leaving our home. We do stool samples on each litter - if anything was found we will either worm the puppy ourselves or send home the appropriate medication, from our vet, for them to complete. We always recommend additional stool samples over the next 2 months in order to be sure that all puppy parasites have been taken care of.
